2	meeting to order. As is our normal practice,
3	I'd like to make sure that the public

5	permission once more, as well. So we'll start

1	DR. ALLEN: Okay, everybody,
2	thank you for being here. We expect to be very
3	direct and intentional.
4	What we have before you is the
5	agenda; it's outlined as approval of the
6	minutes. The updates to the redistricting
7	plans, December 9th, it was emailed to the
8	commission on Saturday. A vote to submit the
9	plan to the State Board of Education, I'll say
10	more about that later. Committee reports.
11	WEIC next steps, and ask for public comment.
12	Is there a motion to approve the
13	agenda?
14	MS. MINNEHAN: I move.
15	DR. ALLEN: Is there a second?
16	UNKNOWN: I second.
17	DR. ALLEN: So ordered.
18	Is there a motion to approve the
19	minutes?
20	MS. TAYLOR: So moved.
21	DR. ALLEN: Is there a second?
22	UNKNOWN: Second.
23	DR. ALLEN: So ordered.
24	As I said, updates to the



redistricting plan of December 9th were sent
out on this past Saturday. They included the
conversation from our last commission meeting
with regards to funding and choice. The other
modifications were specifically minor. We've
had the opportunity to review them now. Shall
I say that there will be no changes made to the
document at this time; that's been a part of
our normal process throughout. And what will
happen is you will vote on this document as
it's been presented, either up or down to be
submitted to the State Board of Education on
this Thursday, December 17th.
So before I offer a motion to do
that, I'm going to go over the ground rules for
that. First, we will do a roll call vote,
which is to say that each commissioner will be
asked if they have any comments, to offer their
comments before they make their vote, then to
cast their vote. So if you have a comment
before you'd like to cast your vote, please do
so at this time.
We do have a court reporter here,

1	including public comment we'll be having very,
2	very briefly.
3	I should say relative to the
4	vote, we will hear a motion, it's to either
5	submit or to not submit. I'll say it again.
6	To submit or not to submit the full packet to
7	the State Board of Education on December 17th.
8	Are there any questions before we
9	get started? Ralph?
10	MR. ACKERMAN: Will we go over
11	the updates to the plan of December 9 before we
12	take a vote?
13	DR. ALLEN: Sure. Sure. Can we
14	get a mike to Dan?
15	MR. RICH: The conversation
16	reflected a desire to have clarification on the
17	elements. None of them were removed, no basic
18	changes on what's recommended. It was a
19	clarification on each case, and a stipulation
20	that would make clear that roll-out was
21	intended to be incorporated already, and then
22	we made that more explicit in a number of
23	places.
24	There was wording with regard to

the discussion of a choice structure at the redistricting, and that was clarified, some of that wording.

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There was one additional change that was made specifically at the request of the State Board which literally entailed removal of a word. It's in the section, reference section in the executive summary that you have in front of you. If you go to the resolution and you look at item 4, it said previously shall be confirmed by the state board, and we removed by the state board. Ιt will still be confirmed, but confirmed by approval of the plan; that's the understanding. And by the way, that's the understanding of the state board.

So they wanted it that way because of the way in which the mandate is written where they interpret to mean that they may not directly affirm. Because there's nothing changed, this has nothing to do with any changes of boundaries. They believe they don't have the responsibility for confirming except in cases of dispute, and it's not a

1 matter of dispute. But they don't contest of the confirmation that we're making based on our 2 3 review with the district, and that's what we 4 have in. 5 So anyway, that came down to one That's the only thing that has been 6 7 modified since email was sent out. 8 DR. ALLEN: Any other questions? All right, let's vote. 9 10 MS. LOCKMAN: I make a motion to 11 submit the Commission's plan, Redistricting in 12 the City of Wilmington and New Castle County: A Transition, Resource, and Implementation Plan, 13 14 in its entirety to the Delaware State Board of 15 Education on December 17, 2015. 16 DR. ALLEN: Is there a second to the motion? 17 MS. TAYLOR: 18 Second. 19 DR. ALLEN: Is there any discussion? I defer to discussion. 20 Kelly 21 Sherretz will do the roll call. We'll go in alphabetical order. When the mike comes to 22 23 you, you'll have an opportunity to offer 24 comment and to finalize your vote.

1 MS. SHERRETZ: Ralph Ackerman. 2 MR. ACKERMAN: Comment first or 3 vote first? Comment or vote first? 4 DR. ALLEN: Your pleasure. MR. ACKERMAN: I'll do comment 5 I think no plan is perfect. 6 first. The one 7 thing I heard repeatedly and at the last commission meeting at city council is something 8 I truly believe in is local control, and I 9 10 don't see this plan addressing local control 11 for the City of Wilmington. I think we 12 short-change the City of Wilmington by not giving them the opportunity to create a school 13 14 district run of, by, and for the City of 15 Wilmington. 16 However, we have to live with reality. We have to live with the work that 17 18 we've done, and believe that we put together a plan that will improve education for children 19 in the City of Wilmington and create a larger 20 21 community which may not be just the City of Wilmington, but will be a larger metropolitan 22 23 district that will include a portion of the 24 City of Wilmington.



1 So I think the time to look back We have to look forward, we have to 2 is done. make sure that we follow through to make sure 3 4 that the general assembly comes up with the money to support this plan and support changes. 5 And at the same time, we have to hold their 6 7 feet to the fire to make sure that that Because if we're not going to put 8 continues. the money in now to make sure the children have 9 10 the education they need so they can have 11 employment opportunities, we're going to put 12 money into the prison system later, and it's 13 going to cost us more. 14 So I vote to submit. 15 DR. ALLEN: You vote is to submit. 16 17 Eve Buckley. MS. SHERRETZ: 18 MS. BUCKLEY: Thank you. I'11 19 make brief comments. I'm sure any document at this point, somebody in this room could find 20 21 something better, a better compromise, but I think it represents very hard, very committed 22 23 people who care deeply about Delaware and about 24 the opportunities to the state and our public

1	school population. We have to figure out some
2	way to allocate the resources to those children
3	and service them in the long run so services
4	stay as a whole.
5	So I vote to support it, and I
6	hope the legislature as they have a chance to
7	look at it will take great care of the
8	education of many aspects of the state. Thank
9	you.
10	MS. SHERRETZ: Nnamdi Chukwuocha.
11	DR. ALLEN: I have a proxy for
12	Councilman Chukwuocha. He votes not to support
13	the plan.
14	MS. SHERRETZ: Rosa
15	Colon-Kolacko.
16	MS. Colon-Kolacko: I support the
17	plan.
18	MS. SHERRETZ: Karen Eller.
19	MS. ELLER: I vote to submit the
20	plan.
21	MS. SHERRETZ: Meredith Griffin.
22	DR. ALLEN: Meredith Griffin I
23	have a proxy for, he votes to support
24	submitting the plan.



1	MS. SHERRETZ: Frederika Jenner.
2	MS. JENNER: I vote to submit.
3	MS. SHERRETZ: Yvonne Johnson.
4	MS. JOHNSON: I'd like to make a
5	comment before I vote. Like some of the
6	previous speakers, a plan has a lot of
7	different parts and is not perfect. But I
8	think this is an opportunity for us to really
9	make a difference for these children in the
10	City of Wilmington, and that's our hope for
11	government. At least \$6 million annually in
12	the budget every year for the next five to ten
13	years, whatever the number is, for the next
14	eight years after that, because that's the way
15	it's going to work. Not that I think money is
16	the answer, but it's our resources.
17	I also want to make a comment
18	that I want to be very happy about that we have
19	done. It's for something that I've always
20	believed in, and I'm hoping that if nothing
21	else comes out of this, so I vote to submit.
22	MS. SHERRETZ: Joseph Laws.
23	MR. LAWS: We need to serve the
24	students and the work of the districts in the

1	City of Wilmington. I vote in support.
2	MS. SHERRETZ: Elizabeth Lockman.
3	MS. LOCKMAN: I vote to submit.
4	MS. SHERRETZ: Margie Lopez
5	Waite.
6	DR. ALLEN: I have a proxy from
7	Margie Lopez Waite to vote to support
8	submitting the plan.
9	MS. SHERRETZ: Johnny Means.
10	MR. MEANS: I have a comment
11	before I vote on it. I heard about two
12	meetings ago that I think either four or five
13	these boards have failed in getting a plan
14	submitted and in action. So I'm voting to
15	submit just for a chance. The more trying, the
16	more chances. So I vote to submit.
17	MS. SHERRETZ: Aretha Miller.
18	MS. MILLER: I vote to submit the
19	plan.
20	MS. SHERRETZ: Harrie Ellen
21	Minnehan.
22	MS. MINNEHAN: I taught in a
23	school for 18 years at Bancroft. Bancroft is a
24	school that has always been somewhat shunted



off from mainstream. It's full of children who are from homes that have no support for them, probably for various types of reasons. We have never had the support that we needed to do the job that needs to be done. And by that, I mean class sizes are too large; there needs to be more professional people working in the buildings, not just teachers, guidance counselors, there need to be psychologists, there need to be people to directly work with those children and their families. All those cost money. Right now, the state does not have a lot of money, but they're going to have to find a way to help these children, because if we don't, you're losing an entire generation. Bancroft is one school that represents many For that reason, I vote to submit. schools. MS. SHERRETZ: Joseph Pika. DR. PIKA: I vote yes to submit I believe this is the best the plan. opportunity of the last 30 years that I've been involved in education to rectify what I believe is an unacceptable and frankly unconscienable situation. So I vote yes.

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1 MS. SHERRETZ: Chandra Pitts. Good evening. 2 MS. PITTS: I have 3 a comment first. I just want to acknowledge 4 the work everybody has put into this plan. I also want to say it is not who is educating 5 our children, it's how. 6 And the plan can't 7 stop here. As a resident of the Red Clay Consolidated School District, I raised my son, 8 which was a fight to try to get excellent 9 10 education for him in the Red Clay School 11 District. That fight took me to charter 12 school, and ultimately out of the public school 13 system altogether. 14 I do believe that different 15 doesn't mean better. There are a lot of really 16 good parts to this plan, and some things that, 17 you know, despite the comments, things haven't 18 been implemented. However, I do think this is a good start, and I just am really strong in 19 the fact that we can't stop here. This is only 20 21 the beginning, and it won't work until it totally includes the plan that really focuses 22 23 on not who is educating our children, but how 24 are we educating them, from classroom to



curriculum to community.

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So to that, I look forward to supporting the submission of this part of the plan and moving beyond it.

5 MS. SHERRETZ: Honorable Charles 6 Potter, Jr.

REPRESENTATIVE POTTER: I was one of the sponsors of the bill in the legislation, SB122, and this legislation put students in the City of Wilmington in a better situation. you all know, desegregation 37 years ago was very impactful on the City of Wilmington. didn't get the support we needed, not only in America but in the community. As you know, the City of Wilmington and city council are in support of this legislation, as well. And now is the time to make the change for the better education of the City of Wilmington. remember the quote from Martin Luther King saying, "Let our people go." We in the city have fought for better schools for a long, long Colonial School District is really the time. peg in this whole experience. There is no way Colonial School District should have been able

to change their mind at the board meeting. Colonial School District has 178 students; they get about \$3 million. They have no schools in the City of Wilmington for the past 30-some years, and all of a sudden now they want to act like they want to step up to the plate. unconscienable, and those justifications to allow the school district to stay in the City of Wilmington busing our city children out of our community with no control. And at some point, the City of Wilmington has to have justice. The formula for changing funding, there are a lot of good things, but I cannot support this tonight based on the Colonial School Board staying, and I will do everything in my power to see that Colonial School District will not stay in the City of My vote is no. Wilmington. Kenny Rivera. MS. SHERRETZ: MR. RIVERA: I want to thank everyone for all the time we have given and what we'll continue to give over the next number of years. I vote to submit the plan.

13	DR. ALLEN: I vote to support
14	submitting the plan.
15	So 20, two no, and one absence;
16	motion passes. Thank you, everybody.
17	Back to our agenda. We have
18	committee reports at this time, and instead of
19	going through every committee, we're just going
20	to ask that anybody that has an update, please
21	do so now. Any committee updates?
22	MS. TAYLOR: I just have one
23	question.
24	DR. ALLEN: Somebody give her a



1 mike. 2 MS. TAYLOR: I just have one 3 question for clarification. At our last 4 meeting, we talked about the difference between 5 poverty and low income. And I just wanted to 6 know, were we changing the name of our 7 subcommittee to meet the needs of low income kids, or were we leaving it poverty? 8 Because I think I saw something today low income. 9 I just 10 want a point of clarification. 11 MR. RICH: So what we did is we 12 did put an additional explanation in the plan which is actually consistent with an 13 14 explanation we've used in the WEAC report, but 15 it hadn't been the plan, about poverty is a societal condition with many dimensions, low 16 17 income as a specific dimension of that But we didn't, we haven't made any 18 condition. 19 change in the names of the committees. But the commission has the 20 21 authority to define committees and certainly to change the names of committees. 22 thought would be that your committee should 23 24 have this conversation about what you believe



1 is the most effective name going forward given 2 all factors. 3 MS. TAYLOR: Thank you. 4 MR. RICH: The footnote is actually in the executive summary. Thank you. 5 6 DR. ALLEN: Are there any other 7 questions? The next step, so everybody knows, and a few others will be going to the State 8 Board of Education --9 10 MS. PITTS: Excuse me, I had a 11 question when you said are there any other 12 questions. The public comment doesn't close until January 14th. So will any edits be made 13 as a result of public comment, or is that just 14 15 for the record? 16 DR. ALLEN: That's for the 17 record. 18 MS. PITTS: So no further edits. 19 MR. RICH: We're not allowed to do that. 20 21 DR. ALLEN: As I started to say, Dr. Harper, the co-chair of the committee, and 22 23 Dr. Pika will all be going down to the State Board of Education on Thursday, December 17th 24



1	to formally submit the plan. We have a
2	15-minute presentation before so doing, then it
3	will be in the hands of the State Board of
4	Education. I think you all know the timeframe.
5	What we have done in regard
6	with continuing is develop a series of opinion
7	editorials, the first of which was published
8	yesterday with Tizzy Lockman and Kenny Rivera;
9	the second one published this afternoon with
10	Karen Eller; tomorrow will be a redistricting
11	piece from Drs. Pika and Harper; that will
12	be followed by one from Michelle Taylor,
13	Judge Kuhn, and Jackie Jenkins on meeting
14	the needs of students; that will be followed by
15	another group of Chandra Pitts and Yvonne
16	Johnson on parent and family engagement; and
17	Sunday's editorial will be from Dan and
18	myself.
19	So hopefully we'll be sharing all
20	that with the various social media, and email
21	conversations will certainly happen at
22	solutionsfordelawareschools.
23	With respect to meetings, this is
24	the last meeting of the year, so happy

1	Hanukkah, merry Christmas, happy Kwanzaa, and
2	if I missed anything, I mean that, too. So we
3	will reconvene at the new year. But before so
4	doing, as a practice, we have public comment.
5	Is there any public comment?
6	MR. OHLANDT: Thank you. Good
7	evening. My name is Kevin Ohlandt. I just
8	want to say I hope you people know what the
9	hell you're doing. This is a big, huge,
10	gigantic step, and if special-needs children
11	suffer because of this, you will be hearing
12	from me, have no doubt. Red Clay has problems
13	right now. So you're putting a ton more kids
14	in that potential environment, it's very
15	dangerous. So I really hope you know what
16	you're doing.
17	At this point, you know, I'm just
18	going to lift it up to a higher power and hope
19	that that higher power is looking out for the
20	best interest of the kids. Thank you.
